In other communities, such a place would be a house of worship or a community center. When SoHo's population was small are less diverse, there were restaurants, cafes, and bars where one would encounter people from various sectors of the community, artists, business owners, workers, families. Concept

To provide the possibilities for SoHo's people to be able to meet and gather again, we are proposing the concept of **The Living Room**, which will offer locals new spaces to live, work and interact with each other and will stimulate them to get back their sense of community.

The living room should offer the cozy Viennese atmosphere and get residents acquainted with the aspects of the Viennese way of living. The modular and adaptive living room should provide living spaces for different groups of people, such as artists, young people, workers and families and stimulate them to connect with each other



The Living Room

The Living Room as a proposed modular space is divided into three different groups. The first one is a living room as a shared apartment, which should provide the possibility of different groups of people to live together or a micro apartment for individuals. The sec-

ond meaning of living room is a mixed-use space, such as Viennese café, which offers different possibilities for people to use the space simultaneously, for example café combined with library or coworking or even with a concept store. The third group is the living room as

an outdoor space, offering additional green areas or spaces for new activities, such as urban gardening or different community events.



Five different sites were chosen for the project, which are to be found in each one of the five proposed blocks. As the aim of the selected sites was to include as different situations and conditions as possible, the project strives to offer diverse new spaces in the ground floor area as well as on the upper levels and rooftops. Individual parcels, such as sites A, B and C are to be completely replaced with new particular usages on different levels. Site A also includes an open space on the other side of the street that is to be connected with the new structure. Site D consists of the rooftop that should offer a new accessible open area for the residents. Finally, site E should become a connecting space for all the different groups of people to gather together and is therefore to be designed as an icon in the neighborhood.


In the ground floor zone various spaces for sports activities, such as dance and yoga studios, are planned, as well as other multifunctional spaces for different gatherings. These gatherings can be extended to the open space on the other side of Lafayette Street that forms an additional area and offers new possibilities to meet and interact, not only for residents but also for passers-by.


The remaining floors of both buildings provide shared living units for families, young adults and other groups of people, which offer a view of the courtyard through balconies and loggias. The maisonette apartments create an even more vibrant and dynamic connection of the community in the buildings.


The swimming pool on one of the roofs is intended to create an additional connection between the residents of this building, a meeting point where different groups of people can sit together and enjoy the view.





